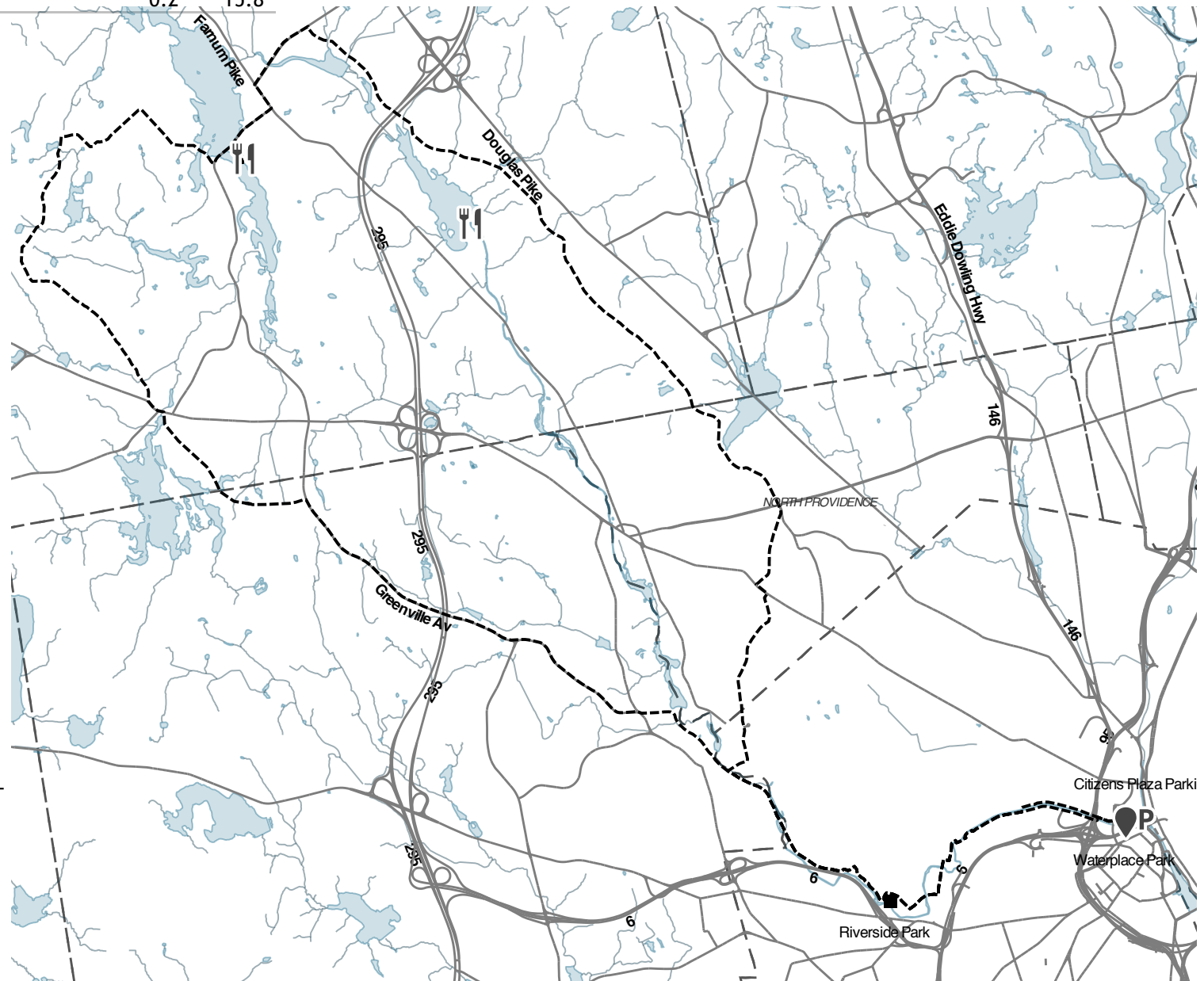

**Points of Interest:**

**A. Brown and Sharp** - Just up river from the Providence Place Mall off Promenade Street is a large red brick manufacturing complex which was the home of Brown and Sharp Manufacturing, the company that built the tools that made tools and machinery of industry. Built in 1872, the site was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2003. Along this portion of the Woonasquatucket, walls of stone that serve to restrict and channel the water bound the river. This provides some flood protection for the adjacent properties (at least in the late 1800's/early 1900's before the up-stream wetland areas were developed).

**B. Atlantic Mills and Riverside Park** - The Atlantic Mills complex was once the largest worsted mill in Providence. Construction of the complex was started in the 1850's. Portions of the complex have been demolished and converted to public use, Riverside Park, and is the proposed site for the planned Woonasquatucket River Watershed Council's new educational center. This site marks the point where the down-stream river first becomes completely bound by stone walls, and the up-stream river begins to have banks and marginal wetlands.

**C. Smith-Appleby House** - Elisha Smith built the original part of this house. He was a grandson of one of Rhode Island's co-founders, John Smith, "The Miller," who had built and operated the original mill in Providence for Roger Williams. As the early settlers moved out of the original colony, they followed the existing Native American trading trails, which were located along the river. Elisha's house was a small stone-ender consisting of one room and was built prior to 1730. The original farm grounds contained mills and a blacksmith shop. The original settlers would have wanted to be able to use the water power to saw lumber and grind grain, but the river also would have provided



may other resources. The Smith-Appleby House is great examples of what life in the pre-industrial era along the Woonasquatucket may have been like.

**D. Stump Pond** - Stump Pond, sometimes called Stillwater Reservoir, is among the newest ponds having been completed in 1918. Its dam was more recently re-built, and the flow was redirected into a new riverbed.
