STABLE AND STEADFAST

Looking back on 2025, one word keeps coming to mind: **uncertainty**.

This was a year when federal funding we had counted on and that had already been approved for work in our communities was suddenly frozen. Nearly \$1 million for our urban forestry work was caught in that uncertainty. Projects were delayed. Plans changed. And like many nonprofits across the country, we found ourselves asking some very practical questions: *How do we keep our commitments? How do we keep our team together? How do we make sure years of progress don't stall?*

The answer, again and again, was **you**.

Your support gave us something incredibly valuable in an uncertain year: stability. It kept our talented staff in place doing the work they do best. It kept the lights on, programs running, trees and native plants cared for, young people learning, River Rangers on the Greenway, and our team showing up for communities throughout the watershed. Your support gives WRWC the flexibility to respond when circumstances change without losing sight of where we are going.

And in 2025, **we certainly kept going**.

We celebrated the completion of the Manton Outdoor Classroom, native plant garden, and major river restoration work in Johnston. We continued building and caring for the Greenway, teaching young people about rivers and bicycles, bringing neighbors together, restoring habitat, preparing communities for a changing climate, and creating more ways for people to find their place in this watershed.

We also fought back when our federal funding was frozen. WRWC joined nonprofit partners from Rhode Island and across the country in challenging that freeze in federal court. We won a preliminary injunction that allowed critical environmental and infrastructure



funding to begin flowing again. Our Nuestros Bosques initiative could move forward, bringing trees, green jobs, community stewardship, and greater climate resilience to Providence neighborhoods.

That feels especially meaningful as we also mark a leadership transition. After 13 years of extraordinary service culminating in leadership as Board President, Lauren is stepping out of that role. She isn't going far—she'll continue lending her experience and energy to special projects—but this anniversary gives us a chance to recognize her leadership and the many people who have carried WRWC forward over the past quarter century.

We have changed a lot in 25 years, and so has the river. But the basic idea behind this organization remains remarkably constant: people working together can revitalize the Woonasquatucket, build an amazing Greenway, and strengthen all our watershed communities.

In 2025, **you proved that once again**.

Thank you for standing with us when things were uncertain. Thank you for investing not only in individual projects, but in the people that make them happen. And thank you for helping us arrive at our 25th anniversary strong, ambitious, and ready for what comes next.

We hope you'll celebrate with us in 2026. We have a lot to look back on and even more to look forward to.

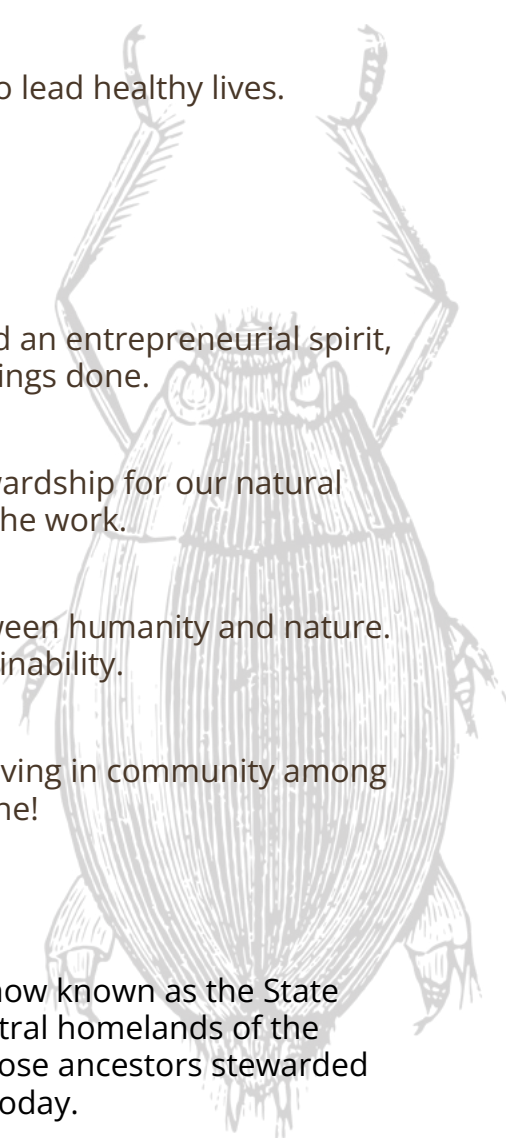

LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

The Woonasquatucket River Watershed is located in what is now known as the State of Rhode Island, on unceded territory that is within the ancestral homelands of the Narragansett Indian Tribe. The Narragansett Indian Tribe, whose ancestors stewarded these lands with great care, continues as a sovereign nation today.



WATERSHED

Spanning 19 miles from its headwaters in North Smithfield to its confluence with the Moshassuck River in downtown Providence, the Woonasquatucket flows through a watershed that covers 50 square miles and includes seven Rhode Island towns. Its name, meaning *"the place where the salt water ends,"* reflects the river's tidal reach and deep cultural roots. Along its path are the legacies of farming, fishing, and industry that shaped the region's homes, mills, and neighborhoods, and that helped Providence become a hub of art, industry, and culture.



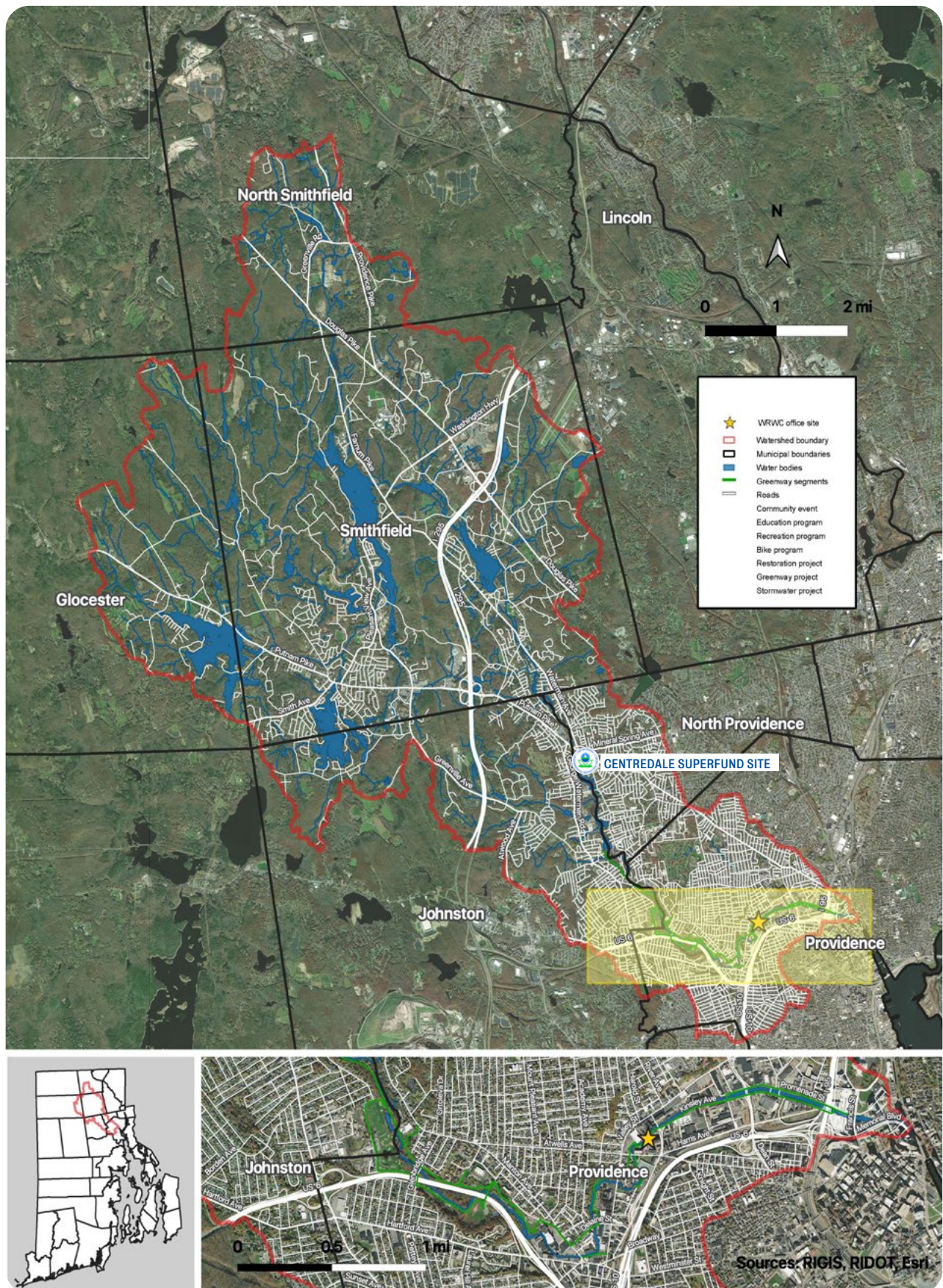
The Woonasquatucket River watershed is one of Rhode Island's most diverse, stretching from rural forests and farms in the north to densely populated urban neighborhoods in the south. This mix of land uses creates both valuable natural resources and complex environmental challenges. The watershed is rich in wetlands, forests, rivers, and ponds—natural systems that filter water, support wildlife, and connect communities. Water is constantly on the move here, flowing across the land and underground before joining the Woonasquatucket River and eventually reaching Narragansett Bay. In the northern and central areas, many residents rely on groundwater wells, making it especially important to protect both surface and underground water sources. Rhode Island's porous soils allow water to move quickly, highlighting the need for careful land and water stewardship across the entire watershed.

SPOTLIGHT ON CENTREDALE MANOR



The Centredale Manor Superfund Site in North Providence and Johnston is the legacy of chemical manufacturing that released dioxins and other hazardous substances into the Woonasquatucket River from the 1940s through the 1970s. Cleanup of the site and 1.5 miles of the river has been underway since 2018, with the goal of removing contaminated material and restoring a healthier river ecosystem. As that work has progressed, WRWC's River Rangers have played an important role in bringing native habitat back to restored riverbanks.

Since winter 2021, the team has helped transform hardened riprap into a more resilient, living ecosystem by installing native plants, conducting seasonal survival checks, removing invasive species, and providing ongoing stewardship. In 2025, that work continued at Source Area North and the Allendale Reach. River Rangers installed and maintained more than 1,000 live stakes along restored riverbanks, supported native shrub and tree plantings, and cared for upland moist meadow and riverbank meadow habitat. At Allendale alone, restoration encompasses more than 32,000 square feet of riprap revetment, while Source Area North includes a 350-foot restored riverbank and nearly 2,000 square feet of meadow habitat.



THE GREENWAY

The Woonasquatucket River Greenway is at the heart of our vision to restore both the river and the communities it touches. What began in 1993 as a bold idea to reclaim a neglected resource has grown into a vibrant, evolving network of parks, restored lands, and a seven-mile multi-use trail that serves as a linear park and vital connection between neighborhoods. Stretching from Providence to Johnston and into Smithfield, the Greenway provides safe spaces for walking, biking, gathering, and growing—physically, socially, and ecologically.



PARKS & GATEWAYS

The Woonasquatucket River Greenway is more than a just a path. Along its route, once-neglected lots, dumping grounds, and forgotten corners are being reimaged as vibrant parks, beloved gathering spots, and gateways to nature. WRWC helps lead this transformation, working alongside neighbors to build green spaces that inspire play, promote health, and restore pride in place. From bike paths and soccer fields to pocket parks and skate spots, each location tells a story of change, connection, and community.



ART ON THE GREENWAY

Art brings the Greenway to life. From murals to sculptures, local artists help tell the story of the river, the neighborhoods, and the people who live here. WRWC works with artists from places like Olneyville and the Valley to bring creativity into public spaces, making the Greenway more fun, more beautiful, and more connected to the community.



RECREATION & EVENTS

We organize community events, recreation activities, neighborhood gardens, and more on the Greenway. From guided paddle trips and bike rides to park cleanups, plantings, and public art, we create opportunities for people to connect with the river, their neighbors, and the outdoors—all while building a healthier and greener watershed.

The Greenway was showcased to a national audience at CNU 33 with tours highlighting river restoration, and community-driven transformation.



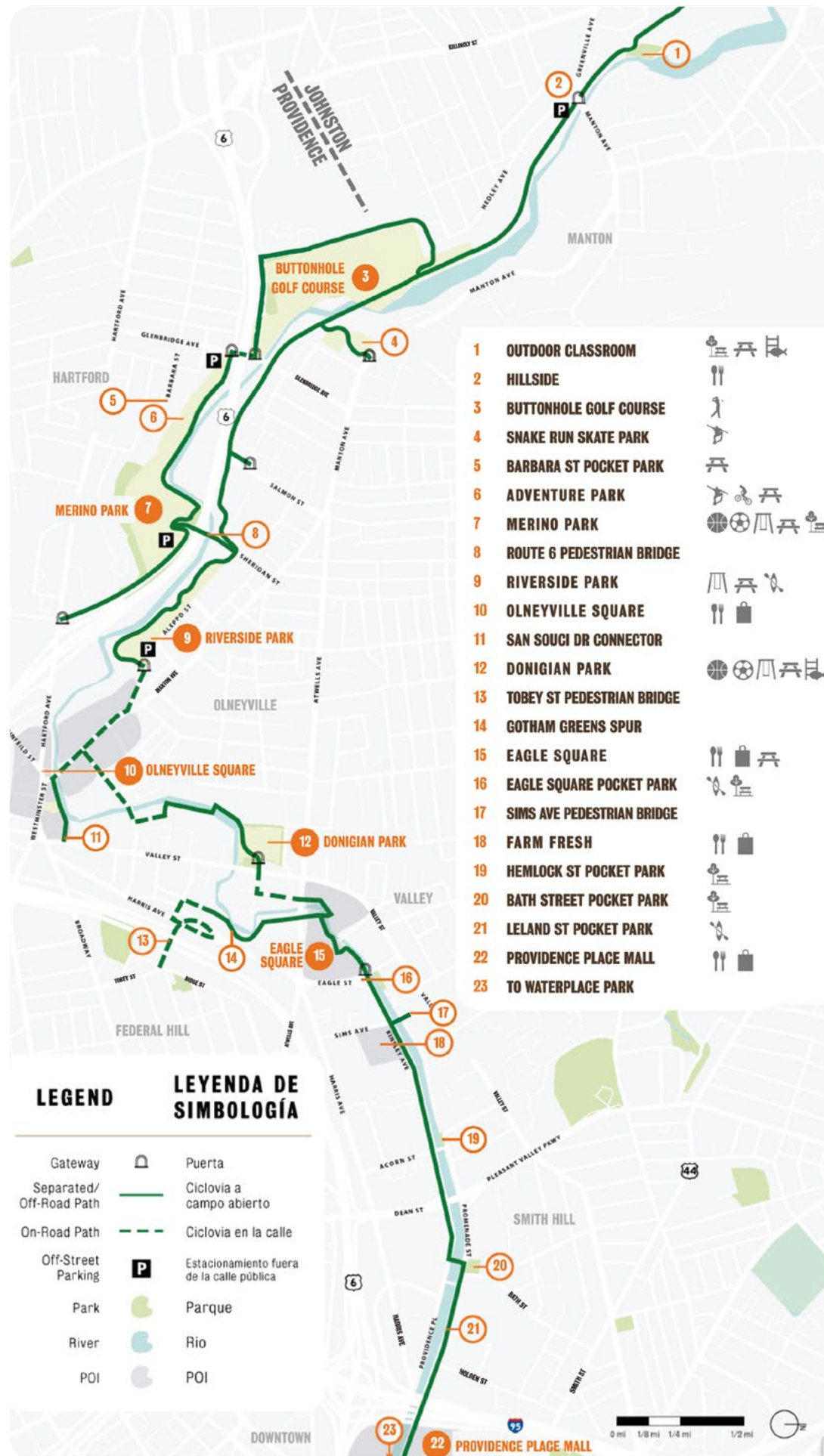
AMPO CONFERENCE

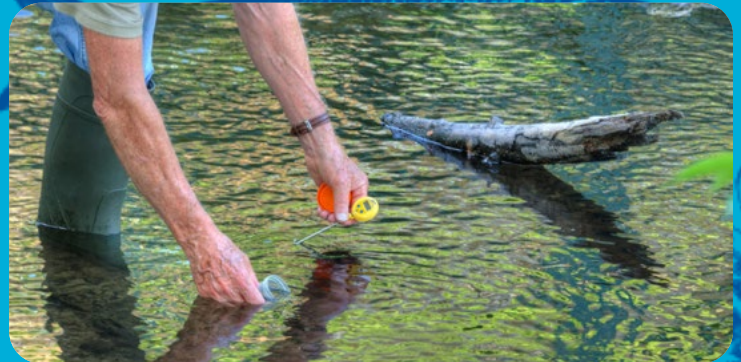

The Woonasquatucket River Watershed Council protects the river's ecosystem through native habitat restoration, invasive plant removal, and nature based stormwater infrastructure. We monitor the success of these initiatives by tracking fish populations, monitoring water quality, and advocating for the Centredale Manor Superfund Cleanup Project site. These projects improve water quality, reconnect and restore wildlife habitats, and reduce flooding and summer heat—especially in vulnerable areas prone to flooding and erosion.



RESTORING MANTON POND FOR PEOPLE & WILDLIFE

The new Manton Outdoor Classroom, Native Plant Garden, and restoration projects transformed a flood-prone site into a hub for education and climate resilience, with 5,000+ native plants, bioswales, stormwater improvements, and stabilized streambanks helping to reduce flooding, improve water quality, and restore wildlife habitat.



CONNECTING RIVER HEALTH & COMMUNITY HEALTH

WRWC partnered with the Rhode Island Department of Health to share new findings about contamination downstream of the Centredale Manor Superfund Site, helping residents understand fish consumption risks and make safer choices when fishing and recreating along the Woonasquatucket.



STORMWATER SOLUTIONS ACROSS RI

WRWC joined partners at the 2025 Stormwater Innovation Expo to share our community-driven approach to climate resilience and green infrastructure—connecting with experts and organizations working together to address flooding, stormwater, and water quality challenges across Rhode Island.



BUILDING FLOOD-READY COMMUNITIES

WRWC partnered with the Providence Emergency Management Agency at the Olneyville Resilience Hub to help neighbors prepare for flooding—sharing practical tools and guidance to protect their homes, families, and community before, during, and after a flood.

The River Rangers are the heart and hands of the Woonasquatucket River Greenway, caring for its trails, parks, and the communities they connect. As stewards of both land and water, Rangers maintain wild and urban green spaces, lead clean-ups, and work alongside local artists to bring beauty and vibrancy to the Greenway. They help keep the river healthy from below the banks—learning to paddle, studying the local ecosystem, and building green infrastructure to protect against flooding and pollution. From mowing to mural-making, their work makes the Greenway safer, stronger, and more welcoming for all.



RESTORING MANTON POND FOR PEOPLE & WILDLIFE

A major program milestone: the Rangers moved into a new 2,500-square-foot Ranger Station near Riverisde and Merino Park, giving the team heated indoor space, a loading dock, equipment/tool storage, bathrooms, sinks, and a shower.



WRWC AWARDED SNEP MINI-GRANT

This grant expanded River Ranger stewardship capacity by supporting equipment such as the e-bike watering system and chipper, strengthening their ability to maintain plants and trees and provide the long-term care needed to keep them thriving.



GROWING RESTORATION FROM SEED

A new seed freezer and hands-on community workshops expanded the River Rangers' native plant restoration work. With this freezer, the Rangers are now collecting seeds, growing climate-adapted native species, and bringing them back to the Greenway to restore habitat and support pollinators.



35,000 NATIVE BULBS AND PLANTS

The River Rangers planted and cared for 35,000 native bulbs and plants along the Greenway. The plantings provide more habitat for pollinators, strengthen biodiversity, and create healthier, more resilient landscapes throughout the watershed.

200+ RESIDENTS attended eight bilingual workshops covering flood preparedness, tree equity, solar access, lead safety, transportation, and climate resilience



21 COMMUNITY LEADERS graduated from the fourth Nuevas Voces cohort, while **20 NEW PARTICIPANTS** began Cohort five and **8 GRADUATES** advanced into the Campeones leadership program



25 NEIGHBORS grew food in the Joslin Community Garden, supported by **50+ VOLUNTEERS** who contributed more than **200 HOURS** of service



VECINA, the bilingual neighborhood advocacy tool developed with Nuevas Voces alumni and research partners **LAUNCHED**



WRWC's Community Action programs empower residents of the lower Woonasquatucket River Watershed through bilingual leadership training, community organizing, and free, family-friendly events. Rooted in equity and collaboration, this work ensures that local voices shape the future of their neighborhoods and the river itself. Through programs like Nuevas Voces and Campeones del Combate Climático, WRWC cultivates local environmental leaders who influence policies, infrastructure, and public health in their own neighborhoods.



BUILDING CIVIC POWER

Nuevas Voces participants explored how city and state government work and how residents can make their voices heard, building the knowledge, tools, and confidence to engage with elected officials, advocate on community issues, and participate in local decision-making.



EXPLORING AIR QUALITY

Participants explored how air pollution affects their neighborhoods and health through bilingual, hands-on learning, using air quality monitors and gaining practical tools to better understand and respond to poor air quality.



CELEBRATING NUEVAS VOCES LEADERS

After 10 months of bilingual learning and community action, the 2024–25 Nuevas Voces cohort graduated, joining 50+ residents who have completed the program since 2020 and are building stronger voices in their communities.



MAKING SOIL AND FRIENDS

Neighbors and Nuevas Voces participants installed a new compost system at Joslin Community Garden that turns plant waste into healthy soil while community members build hands-on sustainability skills.



Olneyville Resilience Hub

WRWC continues to serve as a backbone organization for the Olneyville Resilience Hub, a community-centered space connecting residents with resources, programs, and opportunities to shape their neighborhood. In 2025, the Hub continued to grow as a place for community connection, offering programming and services focused on climate resilience, health, language access, emergency preparedness, and more—all guided by resident priorities and partnerships.

NEARLY \$1 MILLION RESTORED FOR URBAN FORESTRY

WRWC successfully fought the federal funding freeze in court, allowing the Nuestros Bosques work to move forward



300+ TREES along the river received ongoing community care



145 TREES PLANTED across 9 sites throughout the watershed



317 PEOPLE attended tree plantings and community events



Nuestros Bosques is a community-driven urban forestry initiative that brings Providence residents together to plant, care for, and advocate for trees in neighborhoods like Olneyville, Manton, Mount Pleasant, and Valley. Through tree planting, stewardship, and leadership training, the program works to reduce urban heat, manage stormwater, improve air quality, and protect the Woonasquatucket River. Over the next three years, Nuestros Bosques will plant a fast-growing Miyawaki forest, train more than 50 community tree stewards, and care for hundreds of trees while building greener, healthier, and more climate-resilient neighborhoods.



A BIG WIN FOR TREES

WRWC secured nearly \$1 million for Nuestros Bosques after successfully challenging a federal funding freeze. The investment is expanding community-driven urban forestry along the Greenway, supporting new trees and green spaces, local tree stewardship, and healthier neighborhoods while reducing heat, managing stormwater, protecting streambanks, and strengthening biodiversity.



COMMUNITY-DRIVEN URBAN FOREST

50+ neighbors joined Providence's first Community Tree Forum to help shape the future of their neighborhood canopy. Through hands-on activities and conversations, residents identified where trees are most needed, explored which species would thrive, and shared ideas for making tree planting and care more equitable, community-driven, and resilient.



A GREENER MANTON HEIGHTS

Around 20 volunteers transformed 1,680 square feet of green space at Manton Heights, planting 6 trees, 24 understory plants, and 38 shrubs. The Nuestros Bosques planting brought neighbors together to expand shade and habitat while giving residents a hands-on role in growing and caring for their neighborhood's urban forest.



EXPLORING A FOREST IN RECOVERY

Community members explored the recovering oak-hickory forest at Neutaconkanut Park on a half-mile nature walk, learning how forests respond to disturbance while discovering native trees, understory plants, and the remarkable biodiversity of Providence's urban woodlands.

BICYCLE EDUCATION AND ADVOCACY

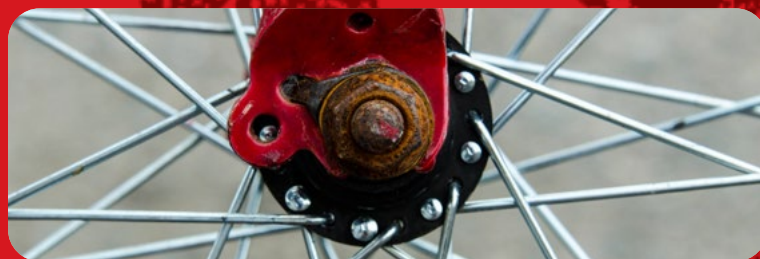

NEW IN 2026: Launching an in-school kindergarten Learn-to-Ride program with All Kids Bike



Our Bicycle Education programs make biking safe, fun, and accessible for youth and families along the Woonasquatucket River Greenway and beyond. We offer year-round programs including the Rhode to Bicycle Safety (R2BS) course for 5th graders. We also offer summer youth Bikes Camps that teach helmet safety, bike maintenance, and rules of the road. Serving over 1,500 students annually, our bike programs combine classroom learning with hands-on riding to empower young riders to navigate their communities safely and independently. Scholarships for camps ensure all kids can participate, with a special focus on teaching beginners to embrace cycling as a lifelong skill and way to connect with nature.



BIKE EDUCATION ON A NATIONAL STAGE

Donny Green represented WRWC at the 2025 National Bike Summit, sharing our R2BS approach and advocating for safer infrastructure and investment in bicycling and alternate modes of carbon-free transportation.



BIKE CAMP COMMUNITY RIDES

Weekly 3.5-mile community rides brought Bike Camp graduates, families, and neighbors together. Growing from 7 to 20+ riders, the series celebrated new cyclists while connecting more families to the Greenway.



BUILDING BIKE SKILLS & CONFIDENCE

Our bicycle mechanics internship entered its fourth year in 2025. In partnership with Trek Bicycles and The Met, students learn professional bike assembly and mechanics while building problem-solving, critical thinking, math, and science skills.



GIRLS BIKE CAMP

Five young riders completed a week of Girls Bike Camp, building skills in safe cycling, bike mechanics, and environmental stewardship. During their graduation ride, this cohort showed up in style to the WRWC Earth Day Celebration in Johnston.

RHODE TO BICYCLE SAFETY

The Rhode to Bicycle Safety (R2BS) program continued building safer, more confident young cyclists across Rhode Island in 2025. In partnership with the Rhode Island Department of Transportation, WRWC instructors worked with nearly 600 fifth-grade students, providing hands-on bicycle education focused on the rules of the road, helmet safety, intersection navigation, and bike checks. Through classroom learning and on-bike practice, R2BS helps students of all abilities develop the skills and confidence to ride safely.

Our education programs spark a life-long connection to the Woonasquatucket River by bringing high-quality, hands-on science and nature learning to youth across the watershed. From kindergarteners discovering bird beaks and brook trout to high schoolers leading community projects, over 2,000 students each year explore, investigate, and care for their local environment with us. Whether in-school, after-school, or out on the trail, our lessons combine watershed science, outdoor adventure, and real-world problem-solving to build the next generation of environmental leaders.



LAUNCHING CAMP WOONASQUATUCKET

Our Education Department launched the first Camp Woonasquatucket at the Leo Bouchard Conservation Center, connecting young campers with outdoor adventure, environmental learning, and nature.



CONNECTING 3RD GRADERS WITH BIRDS

Birds of a Feather brought hands-on bird science and mindfulness to four schools, helping students build observation skills and connect with wildlife along the Woonasquatucket River.



STUDENTS TO ENVIRONMENTAL LEADERS

Met School sophomores tackled litter through a semester-long project, creating anti-litter campaigns and taking hands-on action to protect the Woonasquatucket River.



RAISING FISH IN THE CLASSROOM

Fourth graders raised nearly 50 brook trout from eggs, learning about fish biology, water quality, and healthy stream habitats before releasing the young trout into the wild at Riverside Park.



TRI-COUNTY HEZ GREEN LABS

A new hands-on workshop series brought environmental health education to Johnston, North Providence, and Smithfield, exploring water quality, green infrastructure, gardening, and practical solutions to environmental challenges with local youth.



SHOCKING DISCOVERIES

More than 40 Wheeler School students joined us for three electrofishing surveys, getting hands-on with real river science while documenting American eels, catfish, and other aquatic life to better understand biodiversity, habitat, and water quality in the Woonasquatucket.

Riders explored 8 miles of the Woonasquatucket River Greenway, combining biking with local history and a private tour of the Clemence-Irons House, one of Rhode Island's oldest surviving homes.



CELEBRATING COMMUNITY EN ESPAÑOL

More than 70 neighbors joined WRWC for Spanish-language events—yoga, guided Greenway walks, and Noche de Música y Baile—creating welcoming opportunities to explore the outdoors, get moving, and connect through language, culture, music, and community.

Hundreds of community members joined WRWC for free weekly paddles and guided paddle trips throughout the summer, enabling them to get out on the Woonasquatucket River and explore the watershed from the water.

More than 40 community members joined WRWC for a guided Beaver Walk, discovering signs of beaver activity while learning how wildlife, river restoration, and climate-resilient stewardship come together along the Greenway.

23 hikers, including 6 local middle schoolers, explored Neutaconkanut Park while learning about winter ecology, identifying wildlife with iNaturalist, foraging for wintergreen, and connecting with nature close to home.



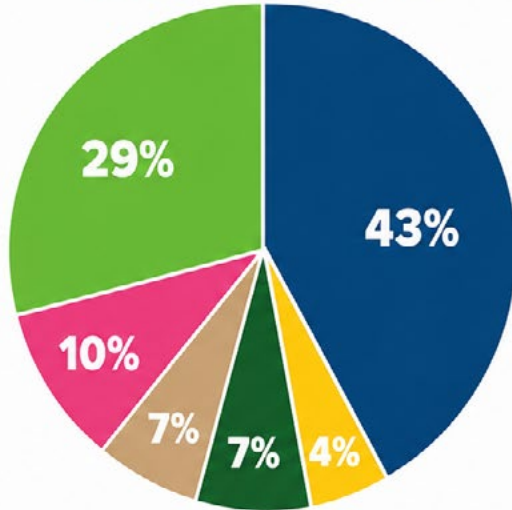
WELLNESS ON THE GREENWAY

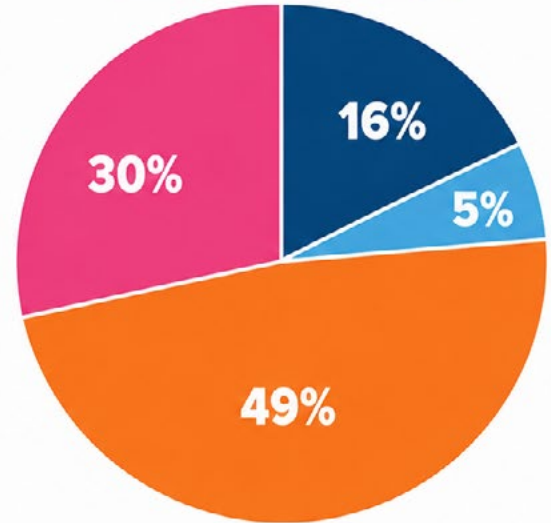

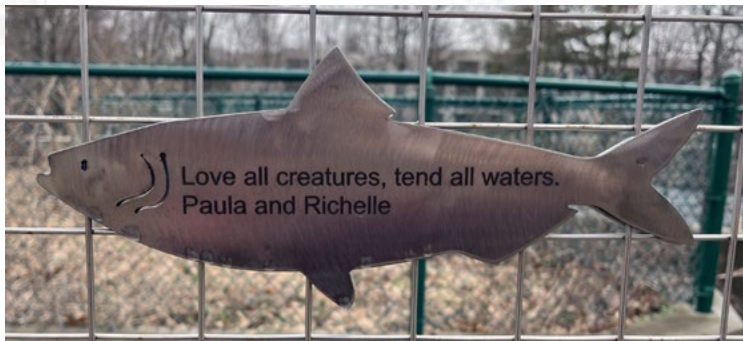
